### Introduction

Children's centre services in Bromyard are externally commissioned and currently delivered by HOPE Family Centre. This contract is due to end in March 2018. Herefordshire Council wanted to hear the views of service users and Bromyard residents to help shape children centre services in Bromyard area in the future.

Children Centre services in Herefordshire supports children and families 0-5 years through our universal and targeted work. With reducing resources from central government Herefordshire children Centre services have had to change and adapt service delivery and ensure the resource is targeted to where it is most needed.

## Methodology

An online questionnaire was published on the Herefordshire Council website and was available for completion between 1st August and 30th September 2017. All residents of Bromyard children's centre reach area were invited to partake.

The consultation was advertised to all early years providers, schools and on the council Facebook and Twitter. This was also promoted via the children centre services Facebook page and the Herefordshire early years educators Facebook page. Officers carried out pre-arranged visits to various locations within the Bromyard reach area including, Play Zone and Health Visitor Clinic in HOPE Family Centre, a parent and toddler group in Bishops Frome and St Peters Primary School, Bromyard.

This report presents the results of the responses to the questionnaire. The base used for calculating percentages is specified for each question. Note that percentages are rounded to the nearest whole number in the tables. If respondents could select more than one answer to a particular question (for an example Q2), percentages may add up to more than 100 per cent.

## Results

There were a total of 184 responses received to the Bromyard children centre consultation.

### About you

#### Q1. Do you use the children's centre in Bromyard?


The majority of respondents (89 per cent) use the children's centre in Bromyard.

#### Q2. If you have children, how old is your child/children?

Of the respondents who have children, the age of those children varied; 30 per cent have 0-1 year olds, 18 per cent 1 year olds, 32 per cent have 2 year olds, 20 per cent have 3 year olds and 31 per cent have 4-5 year olds.

#### Q3. Postcode

Almost ninety per cent of survey respondents (163 respondents) provided at least first three characters of their postcode. The majority (66 per cent) of these respondents live within the HR7 postcode district.


# Q4. If you have accessed children's centre services in the Bromyard area, what were they?

The services that respondents have accessed most within the children's centre were universal services e.g. 'Health visitor appointments or clinics' and, 'stay and play sessions', cited by 57 per cent of respondents and 54 per cent of respondents respectively. 'Parent and toddler groups' (46 per cent), 'Midwife appointments' (44 per cent) and 'Childcare' (41 per cent) were also commonly accessed children's centre services. The majority of respondents did not attend 'Breastfeeding clinic' and/or 'Speech and language clinic' with each service chosen by less than 10 per cent of respondents. Only 29 per cent accessed family support.

'Other' services accessed by respondents in the Bromyard children's centre included the 'café', 'contact centre' and 'work in the centre'.

# **Future provision**

# Q5. From which of the following venues do you think children's centre services in the Bromyard area should be delivered?


The large majority of respondents (84 per cent) thought that the children's centre services in the Bromyard area should be delivered in a children's centre. However, a mixed response for services and support to also be delivered in 'Pre-schools/nurseries' selected by 26 per cent of respondents. The next on the list of venues were 'village hall' and 'schools' selected by 18 per cent and 15 per cent of respondents respectively.

As part of the option to suggest 'other' venues not included on the questionnaire, the HOPE centre in Bromyard was suggested by 53 respondents (93 per cent of whom made a comment to specify 'other') and four other venues were suggested by respondents:

- 1. "Bishops Froome area has large numbers of 0-5 years olds and we do not get any services other than the parent and toddler group run by volunteers. We would like support for a children centre"
- 2. "Children's centres are great facilities when they deliver the services"
- 3. "Predominantly it should be from a proper Children's Centre. If, and that is an unlikely if, Funds allow other ADDITIONAL routes should be provided. But don't dilute the service by thinking that Other Routes can be in place of the Children's centre."
- 4. "The Hope centre is no longer a welcoming place to go, parent and baby groups are badly run with little to offer"

# Q6. Do you have a preference to who co-ordinates the delivery of children's centre services in the Bromyard area from the list below?

Over four fifths of respondents (81 per cent) have a preference over who co-ordinates the delivery of the children's centre services in Bromyard.



#### Q7. If yes, who would you like to see co-ordinate support and help?

Forty per cent of respondents would like 'voluntary groups/charities' to co-ordinate the support and help to deliver children's centre services in Bromyard, while 22 per cent would prefer 'a mix of all of them'.

Thirty five per cent of respondents would like 'other' organisations to co-ordinate the delivery of services. Eighty five respondents made comments to specify which 'other' organisations they are referring to; the majority (76 respondents) of whom would like 'HOPE centre' to co-ordinate the delivery of support. Nine other respondents commented as follows:

1. "I think a mix of schools nurseries and village hall facilities should be used as there are no children centre activities in the rural areas of Bromyard only in Bromyard town so it is very limited".

- 2. "I think it should be left how it is, just more back up and financial help."
- 3. "I think the health team should be involved too"
- 4. "Mainly HOPE centre the most valuable asset in a small rural town providing care, training and support"
- 5. "Much sustainable"
- 6. "The council clearly need to sort themselves out and do what they are doing so well in Hereford"
- 7. "The Hope Centre have been brilliant. I don't know how I would have coped without them."
- 8. "As a provider, myself, of primary healthcare services in Bromyard and the surrounding area, I feel that the co-ordination and delivery of CC services are provided very well by the HOPE Centre. Staff have an excellent knowledge of the local community which has been acquired over several years. This enables them to work effectively and efficiently with vulnerable children and families in this semi rural community. At a time when communities across Herefordshire are becoming aware of the high level of loneliness, and detrimental effects of loneliness, it is essential that CC services are delivered from a centre where parents, carers and children have opportunities for social contact."
- 9. "Don't really have a preference a mix of them all would be best"

# Q8. Do you agree that children's centre services and support in the Bromyard area should be delivered in places where communities have the most vulnerable children?

Over half of respondents (59 per cent) agreed that the children's centre services and support in the Bromyard area should be delivered in places where communities have the most vulnerable children.

What about sessions and groups outside Bromyard row

With no young children I was a regular user of the cafe at HOPE, however I have not used it for a number of months due to not passing through. However my recent visit was a bit of a shock at how different the feel of the place is. Myself and a friend were always keen to chat with the locals and hear of what's on in the Bromyard area from the community that were attending courses and groups at the centre and using the cafe (I visited the folk festival after one young mum advised a lovely day - she was right) It was always a lovely atmosphere and buzzing with people and families but my last visit was very different. The place was so empty and not very friendly (cafe staff were delightful however) People who I can only presume were staff were busy around the centre but on leaving, a family we're waiting in reception but no one was available to see to them. I would love to see the Centre continue the work that was so highly spoken of but is it being used?

With regard to point 8 this service should be open to everyone. I would like to see more groups work and 1-1 support. Domestic violence 1-1 support in my local area would be good too.
