Introductions, Apologies Matters Arising

Aubrey welcomed everyone and asked members to introduce themselves.

Aubrey asked Partnership Board members if people were happy to consent to the minute taker using a Dictaphone today to record the meeting as an aid to taking minutes. Following the minutes being typed and approved the recording would be deleted. All present consented to this.

John then went through the previous minutes which were accepted as an accurate record.

Worcestershire Pathway-Laura Wood, Autism Lead, Worcestershire Council

Laura explained that Worcestershire's current Adult Diagnostic Pathway has been operational since 2011. Assessments are provided by The Family Psychologist Service; assessments take place at their base in Kidderminster. The service is for anyone aged 18+ who is referred by their GP for an autism assessment. See attached for more information.

Laura explained that the waiting time is around 16 weeks initial assessment/triage and then support is offered pre and post diagnosis. In total, the time to get an assessment can be up to 1 year, but the service is actively working with people after a four month wait. The pathway had originally been commissioned for 200 diagnoses a year but around 300 people had been seen. This was due partly to greater demand and partly because a number of young people in transition were transferred to the adult pathway without any ability to be fast tracked; their waiting time therefore increased. This is an issue that clearly needs to be resolved.

Herefordshire Care Pathway-CCG

Unfortunately no one from the CCG was able to attend; however, they had sent a letter in which they acknowledge the current problems with getting a diagnosis from Bristol, including the long waiting times, the travelling and the need for a local pathway that is more accessible. The current solution is that GP referrals for diagnostic assessment are now being passed to the Family Psychology Service in Kidderminster. The letter posed three questions they would like the Autism Partnership to answer on the type of diagnostic pathway they would like.

John read out the questions, they were as follows:

- 1. Does the Autism Partnership have a view on online assessments?
- 2. Does the Autism Partnership have a view on a Herefordshire and Worcestershire model?
- 3. The gap in information, advice and guidance is stated in the Autism Strategy. How could the diagnosis/ assessment service address some of this gap?

GP coding

Aubrey raised the issue about the lack of a single Autism Spectrum Condition/Disorder code GP's can use to record on EMIS those patients who are on the autism spectrum. A number of different codes have been used as a result of different labels being applied: Higher Functioning Autism, Asperger's Syndrome etc., together with some specific codes for children.

Two or three years ago Dr Simon Lennane, mental health lead for the HCCG, undertook to try and get all GP surgeries in Herefordshire to systematise their coding. Unfortunately, he was unable to attend the meeting to update us on that work due to it being one of his clinic days. However, he has indicated he might be available on a Thursday.

The Board had a discussion with various opinions aired before agreeing to set up a meeting with him on a Thursday.

Action 3 – Aubrey to invite Simon to a Thursday meeting to progress this with representatives from the Board

Autism Awareness Day – Tuesday November 5th-Debbie has organised an Autism Reality Experience Bus in the Old Market and one in High Town from 9:30-4:30pm. Debbie has detailed other updates in the document attached.

The Adult Aspie Group is up and running at Hereford City Sports on Grandstand rd. The group currently have 10 attendees from Hay, Chepstow and Kidderminster. Their next meeting is on the 18th of November.

Aubrey wanted it minuted that Hereford NAS had done a great job in delivering a range of activities and initiatives for autistic children and adults in Herefordshire over the past four years since the Branch was set up.


