Herefordshire Local Plan Core Strategy: Proposed Main Modifications (Addendum B): Sustainability Appraisal and Habitats Regulations Assessment Statement

- 1.1 This Statement supplements the Sustainability Appraisal (SA) and Habitats Regulations Assessment (HRA) Addendum that was produced by LUC on behalf of Herefordshire Council in April 2015¹, in relation to the consultation on the proposed Main Modifications to the Local Plan Core Strategy. The Main Modifications proposed at that time, were prepared by Herefordshire Council to address issues raised during the Examination hearings that took place in February 2015 in relation to the Local Plan Core Strategy.
- 1.2 As described in the April 2015 SA Addendum, LUC previously undertook SA (incorporating Strategic Environmental Assessment (SEA)) and HRA of the Local Plan Core Strategy throughout its development. The most recent full SA and HRA Reports for the Local Plan Core Strategy are the May 2014 SA Report and the September 2014 HRA Report, both of which relate to the Pre-Submission Publication version of the Local Plan Core Strategy. **Table 1** signposts where the requirements of the SEA Directive have been met within the May 2014 SA report, April 2015 SA Addendum and this Statement.
- 1.3 The Main Modifications were consulted on by the Council between March and May 2015. The April 2015 SA and HRA Addendum, which was made publicly available, described the implications of each proposed change for the SA and HRA conclusions set out in the earlier 2014 SA and HRA reports. The SA and HRA Addendum also included a summary of the cumulative sustainability effects of the Local Plan Core Strategy and whether the cumulative effects identified in the May 2014 SA Report were affected by the proposed changes to the Plan.
- 1.4 Since the consultation on the Main Modifications, Herefordshire Council has prepared an additional proposed change to the Local Plan Core Strategy. This proposed change relates to policy SD2: Renewable and Low Carbon Energy and the supporting text to that policy. The purpose of the additional proposed change is to make the Local Plan Core Strategy 'sound' taking into account the Ministerial Statement that was issued on the 18th June 2015².
- 1.5 The implications of the proposed change for the SA and HRA findings are described in **Tables 2** and **3** overleaf. The proposed change does not affect either the SA or HRA findings set out in the May 2014 SA Report (Appendix 8) and the September 2014 HRA Report (Appendix 1). The cumulative effects of the Local Plan Core Strategy remain as described in the April 2015 SA Addendum.
