

Hello my name is Kath Wood. Thank you so much for letting me come to your meeting today.

I work for Remploy as a Disability Trainer but many years ago I worked for Mencap and Macintyre and used to support people at Speakeasy NOW.

I am not here to talk to you about my job today – instead I am going to tell you about my work on the West Midlands Stakeholder Network. I will start by explaining what that is and how it helps disabled people have a say – then I am going to ask you if you want to get involved and how?



The networks have been set up by the Disability unit. This is part of the Government.

One of their jobs is to write a National Disability strategy which says what the Government will do for Disabled people. This has just been finished and it tells you about how each part of the government will do better things for disabled people.

They want to give disabled people a chance to tell the Government what they think so they can make policies or laws that are better for disabled people. They also help other parts of the Government to think about disability when they make decisions and also help the Minister for Disabled people – his name is Justin Tomlinson



One of the ways the Disability Unit listens to disabled people is through the Stakeholder networks.

- Stakeholder means anyone who has a disability or who is interested in disability rights
- Network is another name for a group

There are groups all over England - East of England Greater London North East North West South East South West Yorkshire and the Humber: East Midlands: and our local one - West Midlands

The West Midlands network is run by a lady called Louise McKiernan who works for Birmingham Disability Resource Centre. I am a member of the group along with around 12 other disabled people from around the west midlands. The Network is all about finding out what disabled people think, so apart from the group meetings where we can talk we also send out information to other local groups like Speakeasy NOW. So we can find out what more disabled people think.




So let me tell you a bit more about what we do.

We can talk about the rights of disabled people and tell the group if we are worried about things that make it hard for us

We are sent reports to read and then we give them our answers to questions or tell them what we think is right or wrong about the report. Sometimes organisations come and ask us specific questions too.

Louise takes our views and passes them onto the Disability unit, she also talks with the chairs of all of the other networks. But sometimes we have the chance to tell our views directly on the internet.




So this is the time for you as a group to think about how you might be involved in the network.
