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1. INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 A draft Neighbourhood Development Plan must meet each of a set of basic conditions before it can be put to a referendum and be made. The basic conditions are set out in paragraph 8(2) of Schedule 4B to the Town and Country Planning Act 1990 (as amended).
- 1.2 This Statement has been prepared for Orcop Parish Council to demonstrate that the Orcop Neighbourhood Development Plan 2021-2031 (the NDP) meets legal requirements and the prescribed basic conditions.
- 1.3 The Statement confirms that:
 - the legal requirements have been met (section 2).
 - having regard to national policies and advice contained in guidance issued by the Secretary of State, it is appropriate to make the NDP (section 3).
 - the NDP contributes to sustainable development (section 4).
 - the NDP is in general conformity with the strategic policies contained in the relevant development plan, the Herefordshire Local Plan Core Strategy adopted in October 2015 (section 5).
 - the NDP does not breach and is otherwise compatible with EU obligations, and that the making of the NDP does not breach the requirements of Chapter 8 of Part 6 of the Conservation of Habitats and Species Regulations 2017 (section 6).

2. LEGAL REQUIREMENTS

- 2.1 The NDP relates to the area that was designated by Herefordshire Council as a Neighbourhood Area on 18 July 2013. The NDP relates only to this Neighbourhood Area. No other Neighbourhood Development Plan has or is being made for the Neighbourhood Area.
- 2.2 Orcop Parish Council is a qualifying body.
- 2.3 The NDP is a plan which sets out policies in relation to the development and use of land in the Neighbourhood Area and which has been prepared in accordance with the statutory provisions.
- 2.4 The NDP specifies the period for which it is to have effect (2021-2031).
- 2.5 The NDP does not include provision about development that is excluded development, such as mineral and waste matters, nationally significant infrastructure projects or other prescribed development under section 61K of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990.

3. REGARD TO NATIONAL POLICIES AND ADVICE

- 3.1 The NDP has been prepared with appropriate regard to the guidance contained in the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF)¹ and Planning Practice Guidance (PPG).² The NDP will help achieve national planning policies at the parish level.
- 3.2 NPPF paragraph 13 sets out requirements for how communities should engage in neighbourhood planning. In accordance with this national policy, the NDP supports the delivery of strategic policies set out in the Local Plan and seeks to shape and direct development that is outside these strategic policies.
- 3.3 In accord with NPPF paragraph 16, the NDP:
 - contributes to the objective of achieving sustainable development, as explained in section 4 of this Statement.
 - has been prepared positively through community engagement and the allocation of land for housing as explained in the Consultation Statement.
 - has been shaped by early, proportionate and effective engagement with the community and other consultees, as explained in the Consultation Statement.
 - contains policies that are clearly written and unambiguous.
 - is accessible via the Parish Council website.
 - serves a clear purpose in the context of the Orcop Neighbourhood Area, complementing rather than duplicating existing national and Local Plan policies as explained in this section and section 5.
- 3.4 The NPPF sets out more specific guidance on neighbourhood plans, to which the Parish Council in preparing the NDP has had regard to as follows:
 - NPPF paragraph 29: Orcop Parish Council have used neighbourhood planning powers to develop a local vision for the Neighbourhood Area and to set planning policies in the NDP as part of the statutory development plan.
 - NPPF paragraph 29: whilst the NDP makes provision for slightly less than the amount of housing suggested by strategic policies RA1 and RA2 in the adopted Local Plan Core Strategy,³ the Plan includes at its Appendix B an exception case which fully justifies the approach

taken to housing delivery against the basic conditions. The exception case explains that the indicative housing growth target set by policy RA1 has been used as a basis, with local evidence and environmental factors then determining the appropriate scale of development. The suitable and available capacity of land for new housing at the two identified settlements, Orcop Hill and Orcop, has been thoroughly investigated. Making due allowance for completions, commitments, rural sites and future windfalls, the net result is a minor numerical shortfall on the proportionate growth target for the Neighbourhood Area. Across the rural Housing Market Area this is not significant because planned levels of growth have already been achieved, committed and allocated, so that the NDP does not undermine the strategic approach or promote less development. Considering the shortfall in terms of the availability of key services, it is apparent that it will not hinder the promotion of sustainable development. Both Orcop Hill and Orcop lack key day-to-day services. Locating development here will not support local services but will necessitate additional car-based journeys further afield. The exception case concludes that for the reasons given it is appropriate to make the plan having regard to national policies and advice contained in guidance issued by the Secretary of State, and that the making of the plan will contribute to the achievement of sustainable development and be in general conformity with the strategic policies in the development plan for the area. The general conformity of the NDP with the strategic policies of the Local Plan Core Strategy has been confirmed in Herefordshire Council's comments to the draft NDP at Regulation 14 stage, and is explained in more detail in section 5 below.

- NPPF paragraph 31: the preparation and review of all policies should be underpinned by relevant and up-to-date evidence. This should be adequate and proportionate, focussed tightly on supporting and justifying the policies concerned. In preparing the NDP, use has been made of existing published and other evidence sources, supplemented by a comprehensive questionnaire survey, a Call for Sites and professional surveys and site assessments. This supporting material is referred to throughout the NDP as required and is summarised in Appendix A of the Plan.
- 3.5 PPG indicates that a policy should be clear and unambiguous to enable a decision maker to apply it consistently and with confidence when determining planning applications. The guidance further advises that policies should be concise, precise and supported by appropriate evidence, reflecting and responding to both the context and the characteristics of the area.⁴ There is no 'tick box' list of evidence required, but proportionate, robust evidence should support the choices made and the approach taken. The evidence should be drawn upon to explain succinctly the intention and rationale of the policies.⁵ In accordance with this guidance, NDP policies have been carefully drafted to be clear and unambiguous and are based on appropriate and proportionate evidence.
- 3.6 The regard had to national policies is set out in more detail on an NDP policy-by-policy basis in Table 1.

 Policy ORC8 is in accord with national policy to promote sustainable development in rural areas by locating housing where it will enhance and maintain the vitality of rural communities, and to avoid the development of isolated homes in the countryside (NPPF paras. 79 and 80). Orcop Hill and Orcop are settlements identified in the Local Plan Core Strategy for proportionate housing development (policy RA2); outside of settlements new housing is restricted to avoid an unsustainable pattern of development (policy RA3). The defined settlement boundaries provide a basis for implementing this strategic approach by clearly defining the extent of the villages concerned. Policy ORC8 also allocates land for housing following consideration of the available and suitable opportunities. This is in accord with NPPF para. 70. The allocation will help to promote sustainable development in rural areas and is situated in a settlement identified in the Local Plan Core Strategy as a main focus for proportionate housing development. This strategic approach is intended to enable development that has the ability to bolster existing service provision, improve facilities and infrastructure and meet the needs of the communities concerned (policy RA2). This is in line with NPPF para. 79 which requires housing to be located where it will enhance or maintain the vitality of rural communities.

4. ACHIEVEMENT OF SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT

- 4.1 The making of the Orcop NDP will contribute to the achievement of sustainable development.
- 4.2 The NPPF explains that achieving sustainable development means that the planning system has three overarching objectives:
 - **an economic objective** to help build a strong, responsive and competitive economy, by ensuring that sufficient land of the right types is available in the right places and at the right time to support growth, innovation and improved productivity; and by identifying and coordinating the provision of infrastructure;
 - **a social objective** to support strong, vibrant and healthy communities, by ensuring that a sufficient number and range of homes can be provided to meet the needs of present and future generations; and by fostering well-designed, beautiful and safe places, with accessible services and open spaces that reflect current and future needs and support communities' health, social and cultural well-being; and
 - an environmental objective to protect and enhance our natural, built and historic environment; including making effective use of land, improving biodiversity, using natural resources prudently, minimising waste and pollution, and mitigating and adapting to climate change, including moving to a low carbon economy.
- 4.3 The NPPF emphasises that these objectives are interdependent and need to be pursued in mutually supportive ways, so that opportunities can be taken to secure net gains across each of the objectives. The objectives should be delivered through the preparation and implementation of plans and the application of the policies in the Framework; they are not criteria against which every decision can or should be judged. Planning policies and decisions should play an active role in guiding development towards sustainable solutions, but in doing so should take local circumstances into account, to reflect the character, needs and opportunities of each area.
- 4.4 Section 3 of this Statement explains how the NDP has had regard to national policy and advice, and thus how it will contribute to the achievement of sustainable development.
- 4.5 The NDP is also in general conformity with the strategic policies of the Herefordshire Local Plan Core Strategy (see section 5). This sets out a spatial strategy to achieve the sustainable development of the County of Herefordshire based on the three themes of social progress, economic prosperity, and environmental quality. These themes echo the three roles as defined in the NPPF. The NDP will deliver sustainable development by virtue of setting out a balanced set of policies which address each of the strategic themes.

4.6 Table 2 sets out how the NDP will help achieve sustainable development, by contributing to each of the three national objectives through its Vision, objectives, planning policies and Community Actions.

5. GENERAL CONFORMITY WITH STRATEGIC POLICY

- 5.1 The Orcop NDP is in general conformity with the strategic policies contained in the development plan for the area, namely the Herefordshire Local Plan Core Strategy. Herefordshire Council's consultation response to the draft Plan confirms that all draft NDP policies were considered to be in general conformity with their Core Strategy equivalents. Table 3 sets out how each of the NDP's policies align with the strategic policies. 6. EU OBLIGATIONS

6.1 The Orcop NDP is compatible with European Union obligations as detailed in Table 4 and as transposed into UK law.

Strategic Environmental Assessment Directive	Strategic environmental assessment of the NDP has been undertaken by Herefordshire Council. An initial screening opinion in June 2013 concluded that the NDP would require further assessment for the purposes of Strategic Environmental Assessment. A Scoping Report was prepared in October 2017 and published for consultation. Subsequently, a SEA of the draft Plan was undertaken in November 2021 and the resultant Environmental Report was published for consultation alongside the draft Plan.
	The Environmental Report concludes in its non-technical summary that the NDP is in general conformity with both national planning policy contained in the NPPF and strategic policies set within the Herefordshire Local Plan (Core Strategy). SEA paragraph 6.7 reports that the cumulative effect of the NDP will contribute to the achievement of the SEA objectives. Paragraph 6.8 sets out that none of the NDP policies were considered to be in direct conflict with or propose greater levels of growth and development than strategic policies contained in the Local Plan (Core Strategy), which themselves have undergone a full Sustainability Appraisal.
	Amendments to the draft Plan following regulation 14 consultation were assessed in a further Environmental Report (May 2022). These amendments included revisions to policies to address water quality and foul and surface water management, in line with the findings of the Appropriate Assessment (see below). The assessment re-affirms the previous conclusions, the cumulative effect of the NDP with regards to achieving the SEA objectives being found to be overall positive with no changes recommended.
	The NDP has been prepared in conjunction with a formal process of environmental appraisal in accordance with the SEA Directive, whose requirements have been met.
Habitats Directive	A process of assessment of the NDP pursuant to the Habitats Directive has been undertaken by Herefordshire Council. Initial screening in June 2013 found that the Neighbourhood Area was within the hydrological catchment of the River Wye (including River Lugg) Special Area of Conservation (SAC). 	Amendments to the draft Plan following regulation 14 consultation were assessed in a further Report in May 2022. The Appropriate Assessment confirms that the NDP will not have an adverse effect on the integrity of the River Wye (including River Lugg) SAC when the mitigation and avoidance measures have been taken into account.		
	The NDP has been prepared in conjunction with an Appropriate Assessment in accordance with the Habitats Directive, whose requirements have been met.		
Water Framework Directive	 The Local Plan Core Strategy (policies SD3 and SD4) requires that development proposals are considered against Water Framework Directive objectives, including that development should not undermine the achievement of water quality targets. These strategic policies are referenced in Table 3 above as policies with which relevant NDP policies are in general conformity with. NDP policy ORC1 requires that proposals must show they would not increase nutrient inputs to the River Wye Special Area of Conservation and have no adverse effects on water quality of the Garren Brook and its tributaries. NDP policies ORC4, ORC5 and ORC8 re-iterate the nutrient neutrality requirement and/or require proposals to incorporate wastewater and surface management strategies. The Water Framework Directive has also been taken into account within the objectives used for the SEA of the NDP and as a source of baseline information and targets. The NDP is considered to be compatible with the Water Framework Directive. 		
European Convention on Human Rights	The NDP is fully compatible with the European Convention on Human Rights, transposed into UK law by the Human Rights Act 1998. It has been prepared within the existing framework of statute, national planning policy and guidance, and County-level strategic planning policies. In accordance with established process, its preparation has included consultation with the local community and it is subject to independent examination. The policies within the Plan are considered to comply with the requirements of EU obligations in relation to Human Rights.
