Back to school safely



Did you know that one of the best ways to keep your child safe is to ensure all their routine vaccinations are up to date?

Vaccines are important ways to stay healthy. They teach your child's immune system to recognise harmful viruses and bacteria. This allows them to respond and resist an illness much quicker than someone unvaccinated. Once we have been immunised, our bodies are better able to fight those diseases if we come into contact with them.

Immunisations can save your child's life. Some diseases continue to cause serious harm to children across the world. Don't let your child be one of them.

Vaccines are very safe and effective. Vaccines are only licensed for children after long and careful development and testing by researchers and doctors.

Vaccines may involve some discomfort and can cause pain, redness or tenderness at the site of injection, but this is minimal compared to the pain, discomfort and trauma of the diseases these vaccines prevent. Fever can be expected after any vaccination.

Giving paracetamol soon after vaccination - and not waiting for a fever to develop - has been shown to reduce the risk of your child having a fever. Remember serious side effects following vaccination are very rare.



Immunisation protects others. Some babies are too young to be protected by vaccination while other people may not be able to receive certain vaccinations due to severe allergies, or weakened immune systems caused by conditions like leukaemia. To help keep them safe, it is important that you and your children are fully immunised. This not only protects your family but also helps prevent the spread of these diseases to your friends and loved ones.

Black & White House Conservation

If you've visited Hereford recently you'll have noticed scaffolding around the Black & White House Museum, as the historic building undergoes specialist conversation work.

Currently, some exterior panels and parts of the timber frame are undergoing careful repairs due to wear and tear.

As a Grade I listed building, the Black & White House is noted for its national, architectural and historic significance. Built in 1621, it has a rich history including being a home, a bank and a butcher shop. Since 1929, it has served as a museum, offering a glimpse into Jacobean life with its renowned collection of English oak furniture and unique period pieces.

Last summer, we looked closely at the white panels on the building to understand how it was built and what repairs had been done before. We found that the panels were made differently at different times. Now, we plan to fix the panels using the same materials as before. If the panel is old, we'll



use old materials, and if it's from the 1980s or 1990s, we'll use materials from that time.

We'll repair each panel where it is, keeping as much of the original as possible. If anything needs to be replaced, we'll use the same type of materials.

During the ongoing conservation efforts the museum remains open

to the public. Our visiting hours are Tuesday to Saturday from 10am to 5pm, Sunday from 11am to 4pm, and Bank Holidays from 12pm to 3pm. Admission is £3.50 for adults, with free entry for children and students.

Museum plans progressing well

Plans to renovate the museum and art gallery in Hereford are forging ahead.

Planning permission and listed building consent were granted in the summer, and work is now starting on the final detailed design. Once this is agreed construction can start.

The redevelopment includes fully refurbishing the Grade II listed building and adding a new fifth floor. The historic façade of the building onto Broad Street will remain untouched.

When it is completed the new museum and art gallery will house purpose-designed museum spaces, galleries, education facilities and a café. Visitors are promised an exciting interactive experience, with amazing collections such as the Herefordshire Hoard and a varied programme of activities, events and exhibitions.



The building will be fully accessible and meet high standards of energy efficiency.

Chat with the Curator

What are you most looking forward to with the museum's renovations?

I am excited about the new features and collections, especially the Herefordshire Hoard. The rotating temporary exhibitions will keep the museum fresh and engaging.



The new rooftop café excites me, offering stunning views and being one of the highest cafés in Hereford. The expansion, which increases display space fourfold, is also thrilling.

What do you think the public reaction will be? I hope the public will be pleased and find the museum a place they can truly connect with.

Advice for aspiring museum professionals? Volunteering is a great way to gain experience. What are your future plans? I hope to stay and grow in this role for as long as possible.

"I'm very happy to have started this role. It's exciting to work here with lots of enthusiastic new team members."

City art trail

Autumn wellbeing

As autumn approaches, with shorter days and cooler weather it's important that we do what we can to look after our physical and mental wellbeing.

After an active summer, autumn can be a good time to slow down and focus on things to keep you well over the coming months, including nutritious food, exercise and sleep.

Eat well

As the temperature outside drops it can be tempting to reach for food that's higher in sugar and fat. Traditionally autumn is harvest time and a great season for fresh fruit and vegetables for healthy soups and stews.

Exercise well

While it may seem more attractive to stay inside when the weather turns, it's much better for us to get outdoors and get some exercise.

Getting up and moving, such as taking a brisk walk, can help boost mood and give us energy.

Sleep well

The clock change can affect your sleeping pattern and you may feel more tired or have difficulty sleeping. You may find that you need to alter your routine slightly, and make sure you spend time outdoors to get daylight when you can.

Access to urgent 24 hour mental health support is available to Herefordshire residents by calling freephone 0808 196 9127 or by dialling 111 and selecting option 2. If your child is feeling low or anxious for a prolonged period of time, or if you have any serious concerns about how your child is feeling or acting, you may want to seek professional help.

As a first step, you may find it helpful to speak to:

- Someone they trust at school or college – for example, a teacher, school nurse, mental health lead or special educational needs coordinator (SENCO)
- a GP
- a health visitor (for children up to 5 years)

They'll be able to advise you on the support available.

Caring for the carers

We know there are at least 17,000 people in Herefordshire who provide unpaid care.

Unpaid carers make a vital and substantial contribution to the lives of others, yet many don't think of themselves in that role. Instead, they see themselves simply as parents, children, friends or siblings providing essential support to their loved ones.

Despite often putting the needs of others before their own, the role unpaid carers play can go unseen and unrecognised.

It is important that we make sure we are caring for our carers too.

Georgia is an unpaid carer and a founder member of local charity Carers of Herefordshire.

"It wasn't until I got involved with a local carers charity that the realisation hit me that I am an unpaid carer."

NHS

"For most of my adult life I've been an unpaid carer and have not even realised, after all I was just looking after a loved one.

"I currently care for my two autistic, selective mute children and an autistic bi-polar husband, at the same time as managing my own health and wellbeing.

"Twelve months ago, a close friend and I founded the charity Carers of Herefordshire. We provide carers with a safe space to make friends, be part of a community and have respite from their caring role. We've had challenges, but the awards have been amazing."

Georgia and Carers of Herefordshire have been working with the council, other carers and local organisations on a new Carers Strategy. The strategy aims to bring a better experience for



carers in the county, improve the resources available for carers of all ages and make them easier to access. The strategy focuses on six priority areas:

- Value and recognition
- Young carers
- Technology-Enabled Care (TEC)
- Carer assessments and support
- Staying healthy
- Information and resources

With eye-catching graphics that you'll see appearing on bin lorries, Be Clued Up! promotes awareness of recycling opportunities that you might not yet recognise.

From perfume bottles to plastic tubs, Be Clued Up! highlights items that can be recycled, helping you make more environmentally friendly choices.



The campaign also emphasises the importance of reusing items, with local charities and organisations playing a pivotal role.

New bin collection service

The Be Clued Up! campaign is starting at the same time as a new bin collection service across the county. While in time there will be new and enhanced services, most people will see no immediate change. Your bin day will remain the same – unless we have contacted you directly. Just put your bin out at 6.30am to make sure it's collected.

We're calling on residents and visitors to take care about how they dispose of their rubbish, and where there's not a bin available nearby, to take litter home and bin it there.

Litter collection and disposal costs the county over £1million every year, with particular problem areas including road verges, laybys and footways, where people often stop to eat or drink and then carelessly discard their litter.

There are around 1,400 litter bins across Herefordshire. We empty all of them regularly but sometimes they can fill up before we get to them. If you see a full or damaged litter bin please let us know – go online to **my.herefordshire.gov.uk/** or call us on 01432 261800

You can also get actively involved by joining a litter picking group. These groups work tirelessly alongside the council in keeping our county clean and beautiful.

Winning summer for Wetland



Herefordshire's innovative Luston Wetland has had a winning summer, receiving a number of industry awards and enjoying a special-guest opening by television's Kevin McCloud MBE.

Guest opening

The writer, designer and presenter, who is best known for fronting Channel 4's Grand Designs, delivered a keynote speech at the opening of the site, which has been operational for a year, helping to tackle nutrient pollution in the county's rivers.



Kevin McCloud said: "I have always been interested in biodiversity, and growing up in the '60s there was a lot more wildlife on our doorstep than there is now. It's hugely important that we maintain natural habitats that allow greater diversity of insects, birds and plants.

"Something has happened here that is just brilliant, and that is the coming together of people; it is cross-fertilisation of ideas and disciplines. This is a beautiful, glorious exemplar that is a huge success. I thoroughly applaud it."

How does the Luston Wetland work?

High levels of phosphates damage our rivers.

To protect the River Lugg any new building development in the river catchment area must fully offset its phosphate load. So, Herefordshire Council developed a unique global first in creating the Luston Wetland to capture and remove phosphate, helping to improve the wellbeing of our rivers.

The scheme ensures that more phosphate is removed from the river system than is returned to it through any form of development. This provides a boost to local biodiversity and wildlife, helping to safeguard our natural environment.

The award-winning project has delivered wide benefits for biodiversity and has helped to release the potential of 1,000 homes in North Herefordshire, with 620 having already been granted permission.

Parish councils

Involving local people in decision making is a key part of our democratic process. It's at the local parish councils where many decisions are made that affect the community we live in.

Parish councils are run by councillors who volunteer their time to make their community a better place. They represent their local community and arrange services to meet local needs and improve quality of life for the people living there.

Herefordshire has 137 democratically elected parish councils. These include five town councils and one city council. Every parish council in Herefordshire has a Parish Clerk and this is the best person to contact if you want to raise a local issue.

Help for homelessness



While nationally the number of people sleeping rough is increasing, Herefordshire is bucking the trend.

A strong network of support for people rough sleeping in Herefordshire is resulting in many people who had been homeless settling into longer-term accommodation.

Of the 80 people who slept in a night shelter last winter, 64 have now moved into accommodation and have not returned to rough sleeping. This is thanks to the commitment and drive of the council, partner organisations and charities who work closely together to provide a wide-range of support.

Will Neville, Rough Sleeper Outreach Team Leader explains:



Will Neville - Rough Sleeper Outreach Team Leader

"There are many reasons why someone may find themselves homeless and rough sleeping - a relationship breakdown, job loss, eviction, mental health issues – the situation is usually complex. We work with a range of local partners and the person so they receive the support they need, often in multiple areas of their life, to prevent them from rough sleeping and help them into accommodation.

"We would like to see an end to rough sleeping in the county. Our outreach teams are in Hereford and the market towns, not just when we have a referrals but regularly, speaking with people who are rough sleeping, visiting food banks and other community spaces. We would ideally like to identify people who may be at risk of homelessness before they hit crisis point and end up rough sleeping, and we work closely with other services so that this happens wherever possible. This work makes a huge difference."

G streetlink

Streetlink is a website that anybody can use to report someone who is sleeping rough to support services.

In Herefordshire, reports that come through Streetlink are sent directly to the Rough Sleeper Outreach Team who can then take steps to ensure that suitable support is offered to that person within a matter of days.

When making a Streetlink referral, please include as much information as possible – as this gives the team the best chance of locating the person and offering support.

New scheme to tackle flooding

The county's first Community Flood Signage Scheme has been established in Orleton.

The scheme enables trained Flood Warden Volunteers to close small stretches of highway to prevent vehicles driving though flood water, reducing the risk of accidents, breakdowns and damage to property caused by bow waves.

Initially being run as a trial scheme, it is hoped that this can be rolled out to other communities in Herefordshire.

Don't get caught out by flooding

Flooding can occur anywhere, so it's important to do what you can to prepare and to limit the impact of flooding on your property:

Keep ditches and drains clear Ditches and drains need to be maintained to reduce the risk of flooding.

If you're the owner of land or property that adjoins a watercourse, such as brook, stream or a roadside ditch, you are what is known as the riparian owner and are responsible for its maintenance. Where a watercourse is sited between two or more properties, each owner is equally responsible.

Develop a personal flood plan

The Environment Agency have created a personal flood plan which you can download, print and fill in. The plan includes a list of things you should do and provides space for you to note down important contact details such as your utility companies and insurance. (www.gov.uk/ government/publications/ personal-flood-plan) Stock up on sandbags or flood barriers

If you think your property may be at risk, get sandbags or flood barriers in advance. If you wish to keep a stock of sandbags, your local builders merchants should be able to help you.

Flood alerts Monitor flood warnings and alerts for your area. Use the government's flood warning service. (www.check-for-flooding. service.gov.uk/).

Sign up to get Flood warnings from gov.uk by phone, email or text message. (www.gov.uk/signup-for-flood-warnings).

You can get more advice from the National Flood Forum on how to protect yourself and your property if a flood happens. (www.nationalfloodforum.org. uk/about-flooding/preparing/ checklist-action-plan/) The most important thing is that you and your family remain safe. If you or somebody else is in immediate danger and need rescuing, dial 999 immediately.

Meet Herefordshire's school attendance

Since the Covid-19 pandemic we've seen an increase in absences in our county's schools and a higher proportion of pupils are missing out on their schooling.

Herefordshire's Attendance and Engagement Team work with schools and partner organisations to promote good pupil attendance and punctuality and to help tackle persistent absences.

Danie, Herefordshire Council's Attendance and Engagement in Education Officer, said:

"We're concerned that too many children and young people in Herefordshire are currently missing school and this has a detrimental effect on their education. Students that take occasional days or weeks off school miss out on huge chunks of essential knowledge. Trying to catch up can be really difficult and leads to fractured learning.

"Being in school has a huge range of benefits and is important to a child's development as it prepares young people for a successful transition to adulthood. It also promotes positive relationships, which is an important factor for good mental health and wellbeing. Evidence suggests that students with the highest attendance throughout their time in school gain the best GCSE and A level results. "As we embark on a new academic year, we know that attendance in the first week of school in September sets up attendance throughout the year. Children who miss one of the first few days of the new term for unauthorised reasons are much more likely to miss long periods of their schooling than their peers who attended those first few days.

"We completely understand that occasional absences are sometimes unavoidable, but if a child is regularly missing school and showing signs that they don't want to go, we urge parents to get in touch with their school and seek support as soon as possible.

"Every school has a designated member of staff that can help you and your child to remove any barriers to attendance and support them to ensure they make the most of their opportunities to learn.

"We believe that all children and young people should have access to a full-time, high-quality education that allows them to have the best start in life and paves the way to a successful future."

SENDIASS is a local independent service offering confidential and legally-based information and advice including support around the Education Health and Care Plan (EHCP) process. They also offer free training and information sessions for parents.

Funded early years education

More children than ever are eligible for funded early years education in Herefordshire

Herefordshire children enjoy a summer of fun activities

More than a thousand children and young people from across the county enjoyed free activities during the summer holidays.

The Department for Education funded holiday activities and food (HAF) programme provided children who are eligible for benefits-related free school meals with the opportunity to try out lots of exciting free experiences with around 41 local activity providers.

Children and young people were able to try out a wide range of exciting activities from den building, tennis, dance, arts, crafts, football, drama and farm visits.

Every child that attended also received free nutritious food at the session.

The condition of roads in the county is being improved thanks to £38million investment in 2024/25 - which is an increase of nearly £12million when compared with last year.

This additional funding is allowing us to target investment at the roads that need it most, through resurfacing and surface dressing schemes. **Resurfacing** is where the existing road surface is completely removed, work is carried out to the structural layers of the road and then a new road surface is laid. This can extend the life of the road for 15-25 years. However, it is more costly than surface dressing.

In 2024/25, the council is investing £8million into resurfacing, including £5million for A and B roads and £3million for C and unclassified roads.

Surface dressing involves applying a layer of bitumen binder to the existing road surface followed by a layer of stone chippings. The chippings are then rolled into the binder to create a durable and skid-resistant surface. This helps to prevent potholes.

It is a quick process and usually only takes a few hours to complete, meaning we can sometimes treat several roads in one day.

We are investing £3.66 million this year in surface dressing across the county's C and unclassified road network.

You will receive a free inhome assessment, survey, and installations provided by council partners Evolve Home Energy Solutions. A plan will be tailored to help you understand how your property loses heat and wastes energy. This plan sets out appropriate options for measures suited to your household.
