Annual Health Checks	A health check once a year for people with a LD (14 years+).	We don't have a final end of year figure for annual health check uptake in 2024/25 yet. We anticipate that we will achieve uptake above 80% again.
	Will build strong foundations for extension of AHCs to Autistic when national roll-out implemented (timeframe unpublished).	NHS England have dropped national targets for Annual Health Check uptake. However, NHS Herefordshire and Worcestershire will maintain a local target of 85% and we will continue to report on our uptake to NHS England.
	National Target	
	By 2023/24, at least 75% of people aged 14 or over with a LD will have had an annual health check.	An AHC Quality Programme will be maintained into this year – likely with similar focuses to last year. We will confirm our priorities in the next AHC Priority Action Group meeting.
	Local stretch target PCNs 85% of people aged 14 or over with a LD will have had an annual health check.	A study day for doctors, nurses and health care assistants involved in the delivery of annual health checks in Herefordshire will take place on 30 th April 2025 at Herefordshire Town Hall. We have sold the majority of tickets for this event.
		No further updates yet from NHS England regarding combined checks. As a reminder - combined SMI, Autistic and LD Health Check is being

We are now focusing on processing the backlog of assessments in the coming weeks so reports can be issued to these settings.
	 Ensure that services are inclusive and comprehensible to people with sensory requirements Targets	Sensory friendly assessments were completed at Kidderminster Treatment Centre, Ward One and Day Surgery. In addition, Sensory assessments were also completed of Acute MH Inpatient Units in March (Athelon Ward and Holt Ward).

The independent providers will be quality assured by the Integrated Care Board and have a contract to deliver under the NHS. The Family Psychologists are the first to be accredited 2 more providers are going through this process. This will help reduce waiting times. The process is called Right to Choose. Guidance for professionals and parents on the Right to Choose is being co-produced (available Feb 25).
		Investment has been made to Herefordshire & Worcestershire Health & Care Trust to increase capacity of the service to undertake
		ICB have funded extra Autism assessments for young people over 10 years in Herefordshire who are waiting over 52 weeks for diagnostic assessment.
		120 Worcestershire young people aged 16-18 years waiting for an Autism diagnostic assessment have been transferred to the Adult service for autism assessment. 50 Herefordshire patients were transferred in Autumn 2024 and their assessments are complete.
		• Final sign-off the new Autism and ADHD diagnostic pathway for 0-18s has yet to be agreed by the Integrated Care Board. This will be informed by the priorities and available funding within the NHS planning guidance & financial settlement for 2025/26.

Partnership for Neurodiversity in Schools (PINS) project.
